Look for lines that do not contain any vegetables and write them out to another file called 'EricasMenu.txt'. You may assume that the vegetable will be separated from other words by a space.

Example: If the menu.txt file contains the following...

Tomato Soup, \$4.56 Sushi, \$15.89 Eggs with Onions, \$1.23 Cheese Grits, \$5.67 Beef Stew, \$3.25 Tacos, \$3.27 Spinach Ravioli, \$9.75

After running removeVegetables("menu.txt", ['Onions', 'Tomato', 'Spinach']) the EricasMenu.txt file should contain:
